invited guests, parents and friends, staff and, not least, young men of Napier Boys', it is my pleasure to give the Headmaster's prize giving address.

As we conclude yet another successful chapter in the 146-year history of the school and, rightly, celebrate the

success of our young men, we can look back on a number of highlights:

This year has seen many sporting triumphs. Our orienteers maintained their dominance of sport nationally for a record 19th year; The futsal side which finished 2nd in New Zealand

was a prelude to the strong showing by the 1st XI winning Super 8 and finishing well at Nationals. Ethan Martin stood out for his national selection in Futsal to prepare for the Worlds in 2018. Our runners have again performed strongly all year with notable performances at the recent nationals as the junior road race team and relay gained 2nd and 3rd placings. Para athlete, Guy Harrison, represented New Zealand at the World Championships in Switzerland. To cap the year, the Rugby 7's finished 3rd equal at the national Condors tournament.

The Cricket XI have ended the year well with Flynn Allen nailing back to back centuries, while Volleyball earned the right back into the top national division for 2018 and Jacarn Webber toured the US with the national squad. The 1st XV won back the coveted Polson Banner and the form of Humphrey Shield earned him a national call-up, with his captain, Josh Bokser, making Barbarians selection.

A rejuvenated Maori Department made great progress this year, with the Kapa Haka group qualifying for the nationals in 2018 for the first time in ten years. Singing continues to gain momentum whether it is the even larger Big Sing choir or a successful Barbershop chorus through to the superb vocals evident from our boys during the annual musical, Rock of Ages. The talent of the young men has been excellent.

Debating enjoyed success, the year 13 team winning the Hawkes Bay Russell McVeagh tournament in term one, while not to be outdone, the Chess team won the Hawke's Bay title for the fourth year running.

When it comes to standout performances though, the ANZAC speech for those of us privileged to hear it, was the by Head boy, Harry Averill, at the Napier Civic service.

Outstanding.

Two international tours (the US history trip in October and the French New Caledonia excursion in July) provided superb opportunities for our boys to enhance their curricular study. We look forward to a Japan tour in 2018. Such excursions are an increasing feature of schools

Academically, the school continues to successfully prepare our students for a range of tertiary and vocational pathways. You will shortly see the gratifying number of scholarships awarded to our leavers for study both in the Hawkes Bay and further afield. Coupled with the increased access to EIT's Trades Academy, there is ample opportunity for every young man to find their area of talent or passion for life beyond Boys' High.

We often say that success breeds success but I believe strongly that the important consideration is that this doesn't have to be predicated on excellence alone. As we celebrate the achievements of those who reached the top academically, I want to recognize all the young men here today who have shown determination, a work ethic, persistence when things don't go right and a raft of other "soft" skills in order to excel personally. If you have done that this year, then you have succeeded by any definition.

There has been considerable research on whether intelligence is a fixed quotient or can be "grown". The work of Carol Dweck on growth mindsets has been noted in this area. We need to keep reminding you boys that the brain is like a muscle – exercise makes it stronger. That's a simple analogy most males get!

Recently, UK researchers have found that nearly 40% of the children they studied had exam scores which were a factor, not of inherited intelligence but other traits such as personality factors, behavior, self-belief and, importantly for us, the child's perception of home and school life. The importance of positivity and mental wellness in tackling educational challenges is one of the key factors in bringing success to this vital 40% of the population. The boys were exposed to Edmund Otis earlier this term as a taster to building mental positivity around examinations. This aspect of education is an area many schools are now seeing as essential if we are to build resilient, lifelong learners.

A major contributor to a great school year is its student leaders. This year is



no exception as you have been well led by your seniors, particularly Harry and Nathan. Harry has been one of the most exceptional student leaders this school has seen. Why do I say that? He is genuine to the core and lives his values staunchly; his example is a great lesson for each of you boys in the audience. But you cannot lead if there's not a great team, and to our prefects and other year 13's who stepped up into leadership roles in their tutor classes particularly, I give my thanks on your contribution this year.

A number of staff will finish at the end of year. Mr Hugh Forlong-Ford (English and Drama) retires from teaching after 27 years here to become Head of English at Tamatea High School – Hugh, your contribution outside the classroom to the success of Orienteering is also most notable contributing to what may well be the longest unbeaten run in New Zealand schoolboy sport! Miss. Karen Wilson has been a passionate English teacher for eight years, as well as a e-Learning champion and devotee of theatre sports. We wish her well in her new role at Havelock North High School.

Mr. Ben Williams returned to us as an Engineer from the UK after a three-year stint at Boys' High earlier in the decade. Unexpectedly, he leaves again after one year to follow his wife's career to Auckland.

Mr. Paul Lowes joined us for a year and has shown fantastic adaptability across

Social Studies, Agriculture and PE this year, knowing many of the junior boys from his time at Tamatea Intermediate.

Ms. Maxine September has finished three terms in the English department, throwing herself into all aspects of school life during that time while Ms. Annabelle Flood leaves after her year's contract teaching music. Mrs. Wendy Isakson has worked as a part-time counsellor for the past few years. We are pleased that she has secured a permanent role at Tamatea High School.

I thank you all for your many and varied contributions to our community.

At this time, I would like to thank the staff for another year's dedicated work to give these young men the best possible chances for their future. Nothing that we do here is possible without the men and women sitting behind me and their passion for teaching your sons. Please acknowledge them in the customary manner.

In that vein, I would to make several particular acknowledgements of staff: firstly, Ms. Carola Laurs, our Careers Counsellor, has completed her fortieth year of continuous teaching service at Napier Boys' High. This is an exceptional

milestone in any field. I would invite Carola to come forward and receive this small token in acknowledgement of her outstanding service.

I also wish to announce two Staff Study Awards from our Board of Trustees so that the recipients may attend the International Boys' School Coalition Conference on the Gold Coast in 2018. I would ask our Board Chair to come forward to present these: the recipients are: Mrs Kirsten Daly-Taylor and Mr Ashton Johnson.

I wish to thank the dedicated hard work of the school's leadership team: Mr Smith's drive and passion for the school to be excellent in all that we do is an example to us all. Mr. Whyte and Mr. Russell have continued their great work, now leading Napier and Clyde Houses alongside the new Hawke House Senior Master, Mr. Boulton. I thank them for their support and commitment above and beyond. I would also like to thank my PA, Jayne Myers whose support and efficiency has been outstanding in all that she does.

Behind the scenes the finance, administration and property teams have done a sterling job, while the Scinde House staff continue to provide a first class home away from home for our boarders whilst maintaining its unique culture. The school remains in an excellent position to provide for the needs of our students.

I thank our school trustees, led by Ms. Megan Landon, for their support and hard work to provide for the school, as well as the time and energy given by Mr. Kevin Callinicos (Chairman - Napier Boys' High School Association, Charitable Trust and Percy Storkey VC Trust), Mr. Stuart Pearce (Chairman of the Greenwood Trust) and the members of the all of the school's three trust boards, Mrs. Vanessa Tait (Chairperson - Parents League) and Mr. Myka Nuku (Chair of NBHS Whanau). Without their service so much that we do would not be possible.

Finally, to the boys, I trust you remember the examples you have seen today, the product which occurs when talent meets hard work. There is a prize here which is within the grasp of each and every one of you in the future.

Māori

An Honour, and a Privilege



We had the pleasure of a visit from Sir Professor Timoti Kāretu QSO in Term 4 this year. He spoke with a few of our students about his experiences with Te Reo Māori me ōna tikanga, and also language revitalisation in both Aotearoa New Zealand and abroad. He also gave advice to the boys about developing their passion for things Māori, and the importance of the role our environment plays in our language and culture.

Sir Professor Tīmoti Kāretu QSO served as the first Māori Language Commissioner, Executive Director of Te Kōhanga Reo National Trust and is currently the Executive Director of Te Panekiretanga o te Reo, the Institute of Excellence in Māori, where Matua Pōhatu graduated from in 2015. He also has Honorary Doctorates from Victoria University of Wellington and The University of Waikato, a prolific composer in Māori Performing Arts,

Matua Pōhatu talked about how pleased he was to see the recognition of Māori Achievement in the school, and also the delivery of new learning programmes in the Māori Department.



Powering Potential is a Royal Society of New Zealand (RSNZ) event that takes place in Wellington around mid-December each year. - To empower students to realise their potential contribution and participation in the sciences and technology areas.
