From The Headmaster's Office

W ith the early Easter break nearly upon us, we can reflect on a busy and successful first seven weeks of the year. It has been fantastic for me to see many of our boys throwing themselves into a wide range of activities both in and out of the classroom.



Some of the highlights have been, the successful House swimming (won, just, by Scinde) and athletics (also won by Scinde). These days showed school spirit to the fore and I was impressed by how engaged all the boys were whether participating or spectating. The cricket XI has gone from strength to strength and we are proud that they have won their Hawkes Bay qualifiers in the Gillette Cup and will go to Palmerston North at Easter to vie for a place in the final six at Lincoln in December. Volleyball also won through their regional qualifying tournament with a nail-biting win over Gisborne BHS. Our athletes performed well at the regional secondary schools' competition last week with Toby Archer in Year 10 breaking a very old 200m record in the Junior Boys' at the school event. There have been some impressive individual results from the surf lifesavers locally and they now head to the national stage where we wish them well. A number of debating teams competed well at the Russell McVeagh tournament in

Hastings recently, while our actors have completed auditions for the annual musical, Grease, and the talent on display augurs well for an outstanding **show later in the year. In service, the Year 13's led a great group of over forty** boys in the annual Relay for Life and raised a significant amount for cancer support. Finally, it was pleasing to recognise a number of boys for the completion of their Silver and Bronze Duke of Edinburgh awards at an assembly where the Mayor was our guest presenter.

The first of the school reports for 2016 will be at homes within the next five days. These are interim reports and for the most part will lack any form of assessment. On the other hand they should also be a point of discussion and clarification.

The fine weather has enabled the school camps to proceed and for the boys to enjoy the outdoors. We are spoilt in the Hawkes Bay for these types of recreational activities and we strongly believe that the skills and attributes learnt on these camps are an important rung in the development of confident, resilient young men. I would also remind parents that payment for these camps can be staged until November. The Board of Trustees is mindful of the financial demands that education requires of parents and are keen to acknowledge that the school donation is as it says, but these funds allow us to provide a vast range of educational experiences and facilities that are not fully supported by the Ministry of Education grant.

I have completed most of the Year 9 "Ladder to Manhood" sessions and it has been a pleasure to spend an hour with each class, meet them in person, shake their hands and help them understand the special place that is Napier Boys' and the journey they will go on over the next four or five years as we look to help you as parents grow these boys into good young men.

I wish you and your families the best for the Easter break.

Bus Bay – No Parking

Parents are reminded that there is no parking in the bus bay from 2.30 – 3.30 pm. This is clearly signposted. We have 6 buses that arrive to pick up several hundred students. When there are cars in the bus bay, two buses (or more!) have to stop out on the street, which mean boys have to walk on the road to get to their bus. The buses need the space right from the end of the grass at the start of the bay all the way to the end. Parking in the bus bay creates an unsafe situation. **Please do not stop in the bus bay, even if you are "just" picking up.**

Additionally, parents are strongly cautioned from using the bus bay to make a u-turn. With the congestion on Chambers Street at 3.10 – 3.30, combined with the two-way traffic, it is simply a dangerous situation for all boys leaving school. When the buses have to park outside the bay **because of a parked car, it is a disaster waiting to happen. Let's keep all** our boys safe.



NBHS Young Farmers off to the National Final!



W illiam MacDonald and Jamie Arnold have qualified to represent NBHS at the National Secondary Schools' Grand Final of the New Zealand Young Farmers competition, Timaru, 7-9th July.

The Regional final was hosted in Dannevirke, where 30 teams from the East Coast region (East Cape to Wairarapa) were represented. NBHS sent 5 teams of two, which consisted of William MacDonald, Jamie Arnold, Sam Lourie, Alex Stuart, Angus Parkes, Tom Lourie, Finn Beamish, Jack Olsen, Jordan Lawson Whatuira and Memphis Langman.

The morning segment consisted of 8 modules with tasks such as fuel testing, nutrition, wool assessment and agronomy. The Dairy farming team of Lourie and Alex Stuart were the top wool assessors, which gives them options for when they leave school!

William MacDonald and Jamie Arnold, along with Sam Lourie and Alex Stuart topped the qualifying section and went on to the main final, where they were matched against teams from Rathkeale, Iona and Dannevirke. The top two from this went on to qualify for the national final. After a 20 minute section consisting of building, putting up a structure and fencing it off, Will and Jamie finished second and qualify for Timaru. Sam and Alex finished third, which means they will also travel to Timaru if Rathkeale (the winners) choose not to go.

We couldn't have done this without the support of many parents and the boys in the club that work towards raising the funds that can allow us to compete and participate in these events.





Napier Boys' won the title two years ago and came runner up to Palmerston North last year. We had set a tough task to repeat these results again this year.

There were three other very strong teams in PNBHS, Hamilton Boys' and Tauranga Boys'. On paper Napier Boys' were the fith ranked team this year. We started with two comfortable wins against Hastings and Gisborne on day one in pool play. This ensured we made the semis but would be up against some of our traditional tough opponents.

Day two was badly affected by weather. We lost the whole morning to rain and had to use the Napier Boys' High courts and adapt scoring on some matches.

In our final pool match we faced Tauranga who were too strong across the board. All matches were shortened to nine games where the closest defeat was Jacob Verhoeven losing in a tie breaker.

This meant we were to face the top seed and defending champions in the semi Palmerston North. They also proved to be to strong in all positions where Dan Rowe, Andrew Clifford and Harry Averill all lost in straight sets. It was Jacob Verhoeven who put up some strong resistance to only lose in a tight three set match.

We then found ourselves in a play off for third and fourth on the final day against Hamilton. They were very strong with three of their four players having represented Waikato in their respective age groups at the recent national teams event. Our boys competed well with Andrew Clifford and Jacob Verhoeven both losing tough three set matches. Had we won these two tight matches things would have been interesting in the doubles. As it was the doubles was not required with Hamilton coming out on top. This tie also doubles as a qualifying match for the National Secondary School finals later in the year. So with this loss sadly after three years being there **Napier Boys' will not be at Nationals. It was therefore a fourth place finish for Napier Boys at this year's Super 8. Jacob Verhoeven, Dan Rowe,** Andrew Clifford, Joel Chadderton and Harry Averill all gained more valuable experience from the tournament. It was a shame for Roman Walewski who would have been in the team but was injured a few days earlier.

Due to Rotorua Boys' pulling out we were able to field a composite second Napier Boys' team. Hence, Max Clifford, Louis Pratt, Frank Lochore, Jayden Hutchison and Kieran Lansdown compiled our second team. These boys learnt a great deal from the experience with some of these players likely to form part of the top team in the years ahead. They had two good wins against Hastings and Gisborne.

As always it was a pleasure working with the Napier Boys' High Tennis team. I look forward to rebuilding the team for more success in the future.
