s a very busy Term one draws to a close, I can look back and reflect on a successful start to the year. The school is well staffed, classes are settled, assessment programmes, especially for the seniors, are well underway and the boys are heavily involved in a large range of sporting and cultural activities.

I would particularly like to thank all the staff, parents and other helpers who quide the summer sports programmes at school and more particularly the recent summer national tournament week of competition that took our boys to Twizel (Rowing), Rotorua (Waka Ama), Palmerston North (Junior Canoe Polo – 6th), Palmerston North (Volleyball), Taupo (Sailing) and Wellington (Futsal). Basketball was also represented at a North Island tournament in Palmerston North. Highlights of the week were the Senior Futsal team who were 2nd in New Zealand, beating fancied schools such as Mount Albert Grammar along the way to a closely fought final with Kavanagh College of Dunedin. Truman Stuart gained a bronze in the U19 Boys W1 at Waka Ama, where the novice W6 Ahuriri crew finished 2nd in the Bowl final; Junior Basketball won the Premier grade and are North Island champions – an outstanding effort. Our rowing U15 pair missed a finals berth by 0.5 seconds, while we also had cricket represented at the Central Districts final where they ran New Plymouth BHS extremely close in the semi-final. If that's not enough a group of swimmers completed a race crossing of Auckland Harbour to Rangitoto with Hadlee Dyer winning his category. None of this would happen without the goodwill of the staff and parents concerned, these trips would simply not happen.

Culturally, the 'Grease' production with Napier Girls' is progressing well and this is sure to be a highlight next term and it is pleasing to see the large number of boys involved in this. Debating is underway and it is also encouraging to see the large numbers learning instruments with our itinerant tutors.

It is important that your sons get a decent break from school over the April holidays. I trust they keep well, travel safely and return refreshed for what will be an eventful Term Two.

Pause, Think, Do What's Needed, (If Anything), But Don't Ignore!

had a conversation with a mum who lost her son to suicide. It got me thinking. There was a time when we didn't have to worry very much at all about the safety of our sons. They'd go outside and do stuff. If not that they'd enjoy what the library had to offer or get stuck into kapahaka, drama, dance, choir, surfing, playing instruments or sports, and the like. During the holidays, some went away on trips, some stayed home - but we never had to give much of a thought as to whether our boys would get home safely or not.

Often that's still true. Yet there are times when more thought or worry is needed. There is much more prevalence of emotional and mental health issues for our boys. Our eyes, ears, and intuition need to be focussed more to pick up what's going on for them.

When our boys do or say any of the following, take some time to check out the depth of what's being done or said.

Do

Change eating patterns
Change sleeping patterns
Become more sullen / quiet / reserved
Become more noisy
Use more antiperspirant for no obvious reason
Eye drops for no obvious reason
Friendships change
Risky behaviour increases

Say

I don't like myself much Life's not worth living No-one cares anyway They don't give ?@*% I'm being bullied Everyone hates me I'd rather be dead It's not worth all the effort 'cos ...

Moods swing

Each one may be normal pubertal or adolescent development. It may be a temporary emotional hiccup that TLC at home will sort; but it may be much more. A little time checking may save a lot of heart ache!

And if you need it, there is support for your son at school. We have a health nurse and an alcohol and drug counsellor. We have our own counsellors, and the support of counsellors from the EIT counselling programme.

Don't hesitate to contact someone. We don't always get it right either – that same mum reminded me of that too – so please keep trying until you get the help your boy needs! Please don't be put off by your son telling you its unnecessary, or he'll get angry or any other form of fobbing off. What's more important is he gets what he needs!

Bus Bay — No Parking

arents are reminded that there is **no parking** in the bus bay from 2.30 – 3.30 pm. This is clearly signposted. We have 6 buses that arrive to pick up several hundred students. When there are cars in the bus bay, two buses (or more!) have to stop out on the street, which mean boys have to walk on the road to get to their bus. The buses need the space right from the end of the grass at the start of the bay all the way to the end. **Parking in the bus bay creates an unsafe situation.** Please do not stop in the bus bay, even if you are "just" picking up.



Additionally, parents are strongly cautioned from using the bus bay to make a u-turn. With the congestion on Chambers Street at 3.10-3.30, combined with the two-way traffic, it is simply a dangerous situation for all boys leaving school. When the buses have to park outside the bay because of a parked car, it is a disaster waiting to happen. Let's keep all our boys safe.

Yr 12 Geography Trip to the Tongariro Volcanic Centre



n the 4th – 6th of April this year, the Geography Department completed another successful trip to the Tongariro Volcanic Centre to observe both the volcanic landscape and the human interactions operating within the environment.

Under blue skies on Tuesday the 5th the group of 47 Students accompanied by Mr Mead, Mr Bundle, Mr Ranapiri and Mr Johnson completed the Tongariro Crossing in just under 6 hours. The boys were treated to spectacular views of the environment from both the South Crater and the Red Crater of Mt Tongariro, with many vowing to return to climb Mt Ngauruhoe and enjoying the scree slopes it has to offer. After the walk the group headed to the Tokaanu Hot Springs to enjoy a well-earned soak in the thermal baths.

In addition to the crossing, the trip also encompassed a short walk in the Rangipo desert to the Waihohonu Hut observation vegetation and landscape formations on the sparse eastern side of the volcanoes. As well as a scenic walk to the Taranaki Falls, on the North Western flank of Mt Ruapehu.

The behaviour and attitude of the students on this trip ensure that the Geography department looks forward to another successful Tongariro Fieldtrip during term 1 2017, in addition to the proposed Vietnam trip scheduled for the Term 2 holidays 2017, interest dependant.



Careers

t is hard to believe that Term One has vanished and that we will be going into a Winter term when seniors really need to concentrate on gaining as many internals as possible.

We have successfully interviewed all our Year 13's and I have gone over the research they need to do on the courses they are applying for at the end of the year. It is very pleasing to see that most Year 13's have an idea about the polytechnics, universities, or the gap year they are proposing to enter. However a lot of them have not discussed their courses with parents, nor the finances and accommodation needed by the beginning of next year. The **Career Expo** is open to **all our students.** Please parents make a time to bring your son (no matter what year group he is in) to the hall on the **25th of May at 6.30pm** as we have **35 tertiary providers** from all over NZ coming in to discuss information, questions and concerns relating to your son's career direction. Careers are constantly changing so it pays to keep apace with the latest new degrees and courses available. This visit to the expo will also allow your son to realise the importance and relevance of why he needs his Maths, English, Science and contributing subjects as polytechnics, apprenticeships, the forces, and universities are constantly changing their benchmarks due to the competitive world of work. The more goal orientated your son is the more confident he will be in moving forward.

On that note I congratulate all our Year 13's who have been attending all our lunchtime tertiary visits. We have had a huge increase in Year 12's and 13's attending to become informed on where they wish to be in the future. Having recently returned from two conferences in Christchurch and Auckland I ran into previous students both at Lincoln and AUT that are achieving amazing results and enjoying various pathways from Ag Sciences to Health Sciences. It is good to see our young old boys all over the country making their mark and taking on technological challenges in their studies whether it be mastering drones at Lincoln to engineering, broadcasting, sports science, medical fields in Auckland.

I have also been setting goals with all our Year 9's on Office 365 online. It is important to establish goals early and maintain them. You as a parent can ask your son to share these with you and feel free to contact me at any time to discuss their career interests.

Next term I will be focussing on Year 12's to ensure they have the right subjects for their careers while Year 13's will be creating a CV online for scholarships and part time work. Office 365 Free to NBHS Students

Il students have been provided with an Office365 account. This gives them access to Outlook Mail, OneDrive (1TB of cloud storage) and Microsoft Office ProPlus for PC or Mac.

The Windows version contains all current Office applications. The Mac version is based on Office2011 and includes Word, Powerpoint, Excel and Outlook.

Each subscription licence allows students to install Microsoft Office on up to five computers. Students can also run Office Mobile for Android or iPhone on up to five mobile devices.

To install Office

 Open Google and type 'portal 365' into the search space. The first choice suggested will be 'Sign in to Office 365'.



The program will then install.





Orienteering

The year began with the Summer Series, seven races on small, mainly city maps followed by a final. We managed to place three boys in the Under 16 final (Adam Barron, Nick Wright and Kingston Webb) and three in the Open final (David Rawnsley, Logan Stevenson and Bayley Stephens-Ellison). In fact David was the top qualifier but faced with competing in Havelock North, home turf for his rival, he had to settle for second while Bayley was a comfortable third.

David was crying out for revenge at the first round of the Hawke's Bay Schools' Championship – the sprint. This was held at Onekawa, neutral ground. Revenge was sweet and David duly won the Senior Boys' by half a minute. He was followed by Head Boy, Will Tremain in third place. In the Junior race, Daniel Harvey was our only podium finisher, with a very strong run for second. However in the Intermediate contest we had a convincing trifecta: Bayley first, Kingston second and Seb Ayson Macfarlane third. Another pleasing fact was that we had nearly 60 entries, more than any other school by a considerable margin. Maintaining that enthusiasm is a goal for the year.

Over Easter, a number of our runners swapped NBHS blue and white for HBOC black, white and green, competing at the NZ Orienteering Championships. The highlight of the event was David winning his first two New Zealand titles in the M18 Sprint and Classic races. He was third in the Middle distance. The hard luck story of the event was Bayley finishing third in each of his three races in the M16 class.



ount Smart Stadium provided a setting to remember for this year's East Coast secondary school athletics team.

Don't warm up on the Warriors' sacred turf. Pitch your team tent for shelter but you might find it has blown away overnight. And sitting in the grandstand won't save you when the storm hits — the water will cascade down the rows and take your gear with it.

This is summer sport, Auckland-style.

The 32 athletes from Hawke's Bay and Gisborne, some of whom are too young to remember rain, were not deterred by the most variable of conditions and earned 7 titles and 19 top-three placings in all at this year's running of the North Island secondary schools athletics champs.









We had five students in the team, who had qualified by running, jumping or throwing well enough at the East Coast champs to break the qualifying standards for North Islands. Oliver Marshall set a strong pace throughout to win the junior 3000m in 9:57.98, a race which at one point had East Coast first, second and third. This was Oliver's first major track competition so to win by 50 metres at a full North Island event was a huge effort. Max Taylor was placed second for a good portion of the race but paid for going with the very fast early pace and finished up sixth in this strong field.

Our sprinter Toby Archer ran boldly and gained a second in the junior 300m and a third in the 200m. This was Toby's first major meet so to achieve two placings against more experienced athletes was a great feat.

The NBHS Waka Ama teams attended the New Zealand Waka Ama Secondary School Nationals last week. This is the biggest sporting event on the New Zealand Secondary School sports calendar. 4 days of competition with schools from all over NZ. There are two age categories, Junior (Under 16) and Senior (Under 19). After the heats, each team is put into either bowl, plate or championship divisions. Championship division decides the National titles for each category.

On the first day the boys had W12 (double hull) racing and W1 (individual) races. 2x of the NBHS teams joined forces with the 2x NGHS teams to form senior team "Mataruahau" and junior team "Taraia & Hinepare". The new junior paddlers were lucky enough to join forces with Hamilton Girls' High School. All 3 W12 teams formed strong bonds, paddled their hardest for one and other and had great fun also. The Hamilton Girls' & NBHS team created new friendships and networks for the future.

In the W1 races NBHS had 2 competitors:

Morehu Tamaiva-Eria raced in the Under 16 age group and finished 6^{th} in the plate final in his first W1 event.

Truman Stuart raced in the Under 19 age group and paddled extremely well to make the champ final. He then paddled an amazing final to take out the bronze medal and earn himself a 3^{rd} place New Zealand Secondary School ranking for 2016.

The following 3 days were W6 (6 person) which NBHS had 4 waka ama crews; Mataruahau, Taraia, Upokohue and Ahuriri who all performed at a very high standard based on their varying experience. NBHS had teams that progressed through to each semi-final; bowl, plate and champ. However, it was the newbies of Ahuriri that made bowl finals and finished second.

After a hard days racing on Wednesday, NBHS paddlers and NGHS paddlers tried their hand at rafting on Lake Rotoiti. It was a great unwind. Following





that the boys also hosted a dinner for the sister school NGHS. During the event there were great challenges to test their mental and interpersonal skills.

On the last night, NGHS and Tamatea High hosted NBHS at their marae. It was another fun night with great food and activities.

FUTSAL 2016 Secondary Schools Nationals, Wellington

The trip to Wellington for this year's National Tournament was the culmination of 10 weeks training, in particular for the Senior team who had at times had 3 sessions a week under Tai Barham and Shelley Bowie's management. The senior team won the regional champs while the juniors came runners up to Hastings BHS. Pool play at Nationals was tough for the junior team as only 1 team from the group of 7 would get through along with the best placed team finishing 2nd in the group. Day 1 had four games played for two wins and two losses and with a further win and a loss on day 2 we were placed 4th in our pool and eleventh overall. Nelson College and Hutt International got through from the pool and ended up placing 3rd and 4th.





For the Seniors eight pools of four became a top/ bottom sixteen cross-overs, quarter finals, semis and then a final. Travelling through unbeaten and relatively untroubled until the semis a strong team effort was required to overcome Mt Albert Grammar by equalizing in the last seconds and then winning the penalty shoot out with a stand in keeper. The finals match against a determined and gutsy Kavanagh College didn't go to the coaches script in that the team went 2-0 down, fought back to 2-2 at halftime, dropped away to 4-2 down, back to 4-3 and eventually lost 5-3, despite creating more chances and arguably being the better team. For most of this group reaching this stage was four years in the making and to stumble at the last step was really hard to take. As boys slumped to the floor at the final hooter the odd tear was shed.
