From The Headmaster's Office

With the term well underway, we can reflect on a busy and successful first six weeks of the year. As expected, many of our boys are throwing themselves into a wide range of activities both in and out of the classroom, whilst in their tutorials they have been finalising their personal education plans (PEP's) which will incorporate their goals for the year. These plans will come home for your scrutiny during the year and, done well, should provide the basis for more effective monitoring of all students' progress.

Some of the highlights this term have, naturally, been house events such as swimming and athletics where participation has been high. While Scinde has been to the fore, they are

realising that they will have to work hard this year given the introduction of new academic and cultural challenges to the house competition. Athletics saw at least one record as Bradley Christison challenged the old 3000 m to set a new benchmark. Our team performed well at the East Coast North Island champs last week. Softball has been resurgent this summer with two school teams competing; many of our top players represent club sides but the school will have a team at a national tournament in Lower Hutt, while several players have made NZ representative selections. Our Waka Ama crews won two regional titles last weekend which augurs well for nationals at the Blue Lake later in the month, while our Rowing crews have performed well at club and school

level this season. Hopes are high for our U17 VIII, particularly, at the Maadi Cup. While the 1st XI Cricket has struggled at times, their fight in the field has been notable and set an example for our Colts team which is progressing well in their goal of reaching the national tournament. Sevens rugby has fielded a first team and U15 side. Results are starting to come with a 2nd and 1st placing respectively at the recent Waipukurau tournament. Canoe polo paddles also competed strongly with the senior and junior sides both 4th at the Hawke's Bay championships last weekend.

The first of the school reports for 2017 will be at homes later this week. They are interim reports and should provide a snapshot of your son's start to the academic year and a chance to intervene early should concerns be obvious from them.

The school camps are underway and could not proceed without the commitment of the staff involved, particularly Mr. Wyatt. No student

need miss out on this experience due to cost – there is a wide range of choice available to make these camps accessible. The Board of Trustees is mindful of the financial demands that education requires of parents and are keen to acknowledge that the school donation is as it says, but these funds allow us to provide a vast range of educational experiences and facilities that are not fully supported by the Ministry of Education grant.

Year 9 has completed their "Ladder to manhood" days and it has been a pleasure to spend time with each class, meet them in person, shake their hands and help them understand the special place that is Napier Boys' and the journey they will go on over the next four or five years as we look to help you as parents grow these boys into good young men. The Boys' breakfast on Thursday 23 March is a great way to continue these conversations.

Bus Bay/Picking Up Students

The large bus bay by the Observatory is reserved for buses only at all times. It is signposted "No parking at ALL times." This is because we have buses throughout the day with sport teams, trips, etc.

But most importantly, we have 7 buses that come pick up students at the end of the school day. 6 of them must line up in our limited area. If the buses can't fit, they must go out onto the street, which presents a Health and Safety problem for students. Students have to move between vehicles, and having parent cars turning in the bay makes this even more dangerous!

It is recommended that parents park further down the road, preferably facing the direction they need to drive once students are picked up, to avoid unnecessary u-turns during this hectic time. Please do try to avoid using the bus bay for turns when the buses have arrived.

Please DO NOT park in the bus bay, and leave enough clearance at the beginning and end of the bay. The bus driver will honk at you if you have not left enough space, so that you know to move up. It doesn't hurt the boys to walk 50 metres up the road!

Keep in mind that we are just trying to keep the bay safe for all students.

Book Fair 2017

The public responded in a fantastic way to deliver the students of Napier Boys' High School a healthy windfall profit of \$5000 in the annual book sale in the school hall. Books were again sold at \$1 despite an earlier advertisement that they would sell for at least \$2 per book. The special priced books sold well at \$10 each. The brilliantly clear weather on Sunday which followed almost a week of heavy rain did not stop people from flocking to the indoor sale. Yet again, the Book Fair provided Napier residents, and visitors and dealers from as far away as Whangarei, with a bargain from the biggest book shop in Hawkes Bay (for one day at least!).



Twisted Zips' Ben Cornes: Lost In The Music

Hawke's Bay native Ben Cornes picked up the bass at the tender age of 10 and hasn't looked back since. Over the years, Ben has worked hard on developing and refining his craft. Amongst his various achievements, Ben scored the highest mark in NZ in 2014's Grade 4 Trinity Rock and Pop exam (across all instruments!) and was awarded a \$1000 music scholarship by Napier Boys' High School in 2015.

He's also been a part of several bands including Critical Theory, which drew inspiration from the Red Hot Chilli Peppers but had a funkier and groovier vibe, and his current band Twisted Zips, which recently opened for a Rolling Stones cover band at the Cabana in Napier and fits the punk vibe; "It definitely has a heavier feel about it, it gets more people standing."

It's these moments, where he performs on stage, which Ben says are the highlight of it all. "It feels like it's the right place to be. You just want to give the best performance you possibly can, you want to feel like you're getting lost in the music and connecting with your

band mates... I love it, I see music as a way to express feelings and emotions. It's definitely easier than saying words and just talking. When it comes to my music, I want the audience to feel whatever I'm feeling at the time."

From this Town by Critical Theory is a particular onstage favourite of his because "all of the different parts were floating around for a very long time, and it felt good when you managed to fit the pieces of the puzzle together. When it's played, you just remember all the different practices and places that you tried to write it."

Being able to create the music you want with a group of people you vibe with is one of the biggest perks of being in a band, but inevitably, there are hard times that come with it. Ben says, "It can be challenging to all try and be on the same ground or level in terms of the songs we want to play and the direction we want to go in. It's different every time, [but] as long as everybody knows how you feel, you eventually just talk it out. Sometimes you come up with a plan. For example, everyone

can pick one song each, so everyone's happy. Whereas, sometimes, you just let it happen."

Playing with a band live can also be nerve-wracking. It can get into your head and make you wonder, am I going to make a mistake? Am I going to embarrass myself? If I make a mistake, how do I recover? Ben's advice is that you just need to relax and remember that's it's not a big deal – your mistake won't change the order of the song, just get back into it and kill it.

Ben hopes to continue creating music in the future. "Ideally, I'd like to be making a living out of music and with a band that I feel right in, one that was playing original music. I definitely couldn't stick to a particular genre, for example I would stick to rock n' roll, but it could be punk or the funkier and groovier side of things. I don't like to be defined by one thing."

School Athletics Sports



House against House, student against student, over 500 starters in the 100m races and huge fields in the Shot and Discus this is the Napier Boys' High School Athletics Sports. In the under 14 grade three students were in contention for the championships. Raymond O'Roake won the 400, 800 and placed third in the 1500 this gave him 11 points and 3rd place overall. Baylee Foote won the 200 and long jump and placed 2nd in the 100 this gave him 13 points. Hugo Lynch won the 1500 and 3000 and placed second in the 800 to also earn 13 points, so Hugo and Baylee shared the Junior Athletics Champion title.

In the Under 16 grade Declan Renall placed third with a win in the Javelin and second in the Discus. The real race was between the sprinter Toby Archer and the middle distance man Oilver Marshall. Oliver won the 800, 1500 and 3000m for a total of 15 points but that was not enough to beat Toby who won the 100,200,400 and Triple Jump to win the Intermediate championship.



In the senior grade 3rd went to Jacob Barber with second places in the 800, 1500 and 3000m. Then once again it was the sprinter versus the middle distance man for the title. Ben Lewis won the 100,200, Long Jump and placed third in the Triple Jump. Bradley Christison won the 800, 1500, 3000 and placed 3rd in the 400m so like the Junior grade the Senior Boys Athletics title was shared between Ben and Bradley.

There was only one record set on the day. Bradley Christison broke the Senior Boys 3000m record. The previous record was 9:06 set by Christian Leopard. Christian in that year represented New Zealand at Cross Country in races against Australia. Bradley ran 8 seconds faster to record a time of 8:58. So a great start to Bradley's final year at school where he also hopes to make the New Zealand Cross Country team.
