Nicholas Wright have achieved a first in Mathematics passing all 3 externals Calculus exams: Differentiation, Integration and Complex Numbers with a maximum 24 marks out of 24 in all 3 papers. This is believed to be a first time in this school and in Mathematics since NCEA started in 2003. The only other maximum score was in 1991 when Todd Nicholson gained 100 % in School Certificate Mathematics.



Young Blake Expedition

Congratulations to Napier Boys' High School student Oscar Lynch on being selected as one of only 18 students nationwide to be a Young Blake Expedition Crew member.

The 2018 Young Blake Expedition to the Kermadec Islands will be the programme's fourth voyage and the second to the Kermadecs, in partnership with the Royal New Zealand Navy, Department of Conservation, Ministry for the Environment, Ministry Of Education, Ministry of Social Development, Experiencing marine reserves and NIWA.

Taking its inspiration from the late Sir Peter Blake's Blakexpeditions, which sailed to Antarctica, the Tierra Del. Fuego and the Amazon to inspire and motivate people to care for our natural environment and to understand the issues it faces, Young Blake Expeditions was established by The Sir Peter



Blake Trust in 2012. Through voyages to the Kermadecs (August 2012) and the Auckland Islands (February 2014 and February 2016), Young Blake Expeditions has sought to continue Sir Peter Blake's vision, and also his legacy by challenging and developing the leadership potential of young New Zealanders, so that they may follow in his footsteps and become champions for some of our planet's most unique and special places.



Afoot has been operating under a Department of Conservation Concession License since 2007. Afoot provides guided tramps for locals, international tourists and school groups in the Ruahine and Kaweka Ranges.

For the 2018 year the school has entered into an arrangement with Afoot to provide group tramps and adventurous journeys for students. Afoot provides these services to other schools and has been involved previously with NBHS as part of school camps and with our International Programme.

- skills, simple land navigation, introduction to firearms safety and a rafting trip
 on a grade 2 3 section (except the kayakers).
- Then the last 3 days of camp the boys choose from one of the following options.
- Basic Options \$215.00 \$10.00 less than 2017
 Day Walks. A range of 1 day tramps for those that don't have all the gear or may doubt their fitness. Great Fun. All you will need to is sneakers, a water bottle. Rain coat and a torch.
- Minimum 4 Maximum 8 per camp.

Biking. - A mixed bag of on road and off road riding with some downhill included. You must bring your own bike, spare parts and safety equipment.

- Minimum 4 Maximum 8 per camp.
- **Trout Fishing.** Entry level stuff based around the camp, for those that don't have flash gear, but want to give it a go. A spinning rod and five 10 cent pieces is all you need.
- Minimum 4 Maximum 6 per camp.



Advanced Options – \$215.00 plus

Adventure Tramp. - Three days in the Kaweka range with your guide and a member of staff. Explore the Mohaka and Makino River Valley's and the Mangatanoka hot pools. **Maximum 12, per camp. add \$35.00 =** *\$250.00*

Walk and Raft – This is a new activity this year. Do the first day walk to stretch the legs and then spend two days, with an overnight stop, rafting out to the Highway 5 bridge. **Maximum 9, per camp. add \$150.00 =** *\$365.00*

Fly fishing. - Three days with a professional guide. All gear is supplied. You will learn and refine the skills under guidance of an expert.



Minimum 3, per camp. add \$160.00 = \$375.00

Kayak Course. - Under the guidance of internationally recognised paddlers, you will be trained by the best and finish the week with a two day, overnight trip down the Mohaka.

Maximum 20, per camp. add \$185.00 = \$400.00

Maximum 72 boys per camp, restricted by Maximum 29 on the river (walk and raft and kayak combined).
