

# **NCEA Scholarship Results 2019**

Our top students have received their scholarship results and we are delighted with their successes. Nick Wright, the 2018 Dux, gained six scholarships and will be in contention for a significant scholarship award, as will Amos Plumpton and Jacob Eyles with four scholarships each. Year 12 Mihnea Vlad excelled with three awards, including being New Zealand's top scholar in Geography. George Perry and Hamish Rybinski also gained three awards, while the following students were successful in two subjects: Thomas Wright (including an Outstanding Award in Accounting), Sebastian Ayson Macfarlane, Harry Bird, Findlay Campbell, Henry Knight, Brad Roberts (year 12) and Kingston Webb (year 12). Oliver Burns and Mason Lowe (year 12) gained Outstanding Awards in one subject.

Overall, this was the best scholarship result in the school's NCEA history. Congratulations to not only to our young men, but the teachers and departments who guided them, particularly Geography who led the way yet again!

# Careers -Science- Hands On Down at Otago



I had an amazing time at Hands-on down at Otago University! The trip was beneficial for me in so many ways, from the social aspect of meeting new people from the entire length of the country, to experiencing what daily life as a Uni student is like.

The event ran over 5 days from the 13th-18th of January, and each day was truly action-packed and full of fun memories. The trip down to Dunedin was my first time flying alone, and so even before I stepped foot in the South Island I had stepped out of my comfort zone and gained some independence!

I stayed at Arana College, which is quite prestigious and modern - it's a first-choice only hall so entry is very competitive. At this stage, it's my #1 choice but I will hopefully be heading to the open day where I can check out some other hall/college options as well. The hall experience was awesome - I'm not particularly extroverted but it was so easy to make new friends and everyone was very eager to meet each other and get to know each other - quite different to high school where everyone pretty much has their own groups they tend to stick to after a few years. I now have friends who I am in contact with regularly spanning from Whangerei to Invercargill, and even people from Napier who I hadn't met before.

It was also a great week to become more independent and proactive, as of course we had to do our own laundry and follow our own schedule for the most part. In terms of academics, I was in the Geology group, and spent most of the day during the week with that group. We went on some great field trips including to our lecturer's backyard to dig a borehole where we could analyse the type of soil/ rock at each depth and find out where the water table was. We also did resistance testing to find out how stable the ground was at different depths. On Tuesday we went on a trip up the coast of the Dunedin harbour to look at the remnants of the Dunedin volcano and how the landscape has changed over time, and on Wednesday we were based in the 150-year-old Geology building, analysing our samples to get the average grain size and testing for carbon content. Dr Virginia Toy, who is one of the leading researchers in subduction boundaries and the Alpine fault, guided us. Dr Toy has also appeared in a few documentaries and TV series about

NZ's geology, so it was awesome to work alongside someone who is a bit of a celebrity in the Geology world!

In the afternoon we had 'snack' programmes that gave us a taste of what other Uni departments are like. I had Information Science in the Business department, which was essentially computer programming for businesses, as well as Science Communication, which was kind of like science mixed with marketing, looking at different ways to communicate scientific ideas to the public. In the evenings we had some awesome activities such as a lecture by Matt Carter (a famous marine archaeologist), a quiz night, and a dance.

Overall it was a phenomenal week that I'm sure will be one of the highlights of my 2019. Before attending I was apprehensive about potentially attending University almost 1,000km from home, but after the week I feel confident and optimistic about my future studies down in Dunedin at the University of Otago. I'd encourage any student to give it a go, particularly if they're like me and haven't spent much time down in Dunedin before. Personally, I now feel confident that the University of Otago is my #1 choice for study next year, and I am looking forward to the amazing social and academic environment that will come from living and studying in a hall of residence at Otago.

# Year 10 Camps - 2019

The first two days of camp are the teaching and learning phase. We need to know that the boys have the basic skills needed to safely complete their chosen activities. Topics covered include; knots and lashings, emergency shelters, erect a tent, using field cookers, introduction to first aid, survival skills, simple land navigation, introduction to firearms safety (if time allows) and a rafting trip on a grade 2-3 section.

The kayakers do not raft. Then the last 3 days of camp, the boys choose from one of the following options.

All camps leave 9am and return 3pm.

Camp groups are arranged by class based on the result of the survey.

#### Basic Options - \$220.00 (\$5.00 less than 2017)

Day Walks. - A range of 1 day tramps for those that don't have all the gear or may doubt their fitness. Great Fun. All you will need to is sneakers, a water bottle. Rain coat and a torch.

Minimum 4 - Maximum 8 per camp.

Rough Road Riding - A mixed bag of road surfaces. You must bring your own bike, spare parts and safety equipment.

Minimum 4 - Maximum 8 per camp.

Trout Fishing. - Entry level stuff based around the camp, for those that do not have flash gear, but want to give it a go.

A spinning rod and five 10 cent pieces is all you need. Minimum 4 - Maximum 6 per camp.



#### Advanced Options – \$220.00 plus

Adventure Tramp. - Three days in the Kaweka range with your guide and a member of staff. Explore the Mohaka and Makino River Valley's and the Mangatanoka hot pools.

This is a Duke of Edinburgh Bronze qualifying expedition. Maximum 12, per camp. add \$30.00 = \$250.00

Walk and Raft – This is a new activity this year. Do the first day walk to stretch the legs and then spend two days, with an overnight stop, rafting out to the Highway 5 bridge.

This is a Duke of Edinburgh Bronze qualifying expedition. Maximum 9, per camp. add \$150.00 = \$370.00

Fly fishing. - Three days with a professional guide. All gear is supplied. You will learn and refine the skills under guidance of an expert.

Minimum 3, per camp. add \$160.00 = \$380.00



Kayak Course. - Under the guidance of internationally recognised paddler instructors. You will be trained by the best and finish the week with a two day, overnight trip down the Mohaka.

This is a Duke of Edinburgh Bronze qualifying expedition. Maximum 20, per camp. add \$180.00 = \$400.00

Maximum 60 boys per camp, restricted by maximum 29 on the river with 20 (max) Kayakers. First in, first served.

# **Property update**

It has been evident to the boys and anyone driving by the school on both Chambers Street and Te Awa Avenue that several large building programs have commenced.

We were pleased that the tender for the demolition of the first stage of the Armour Block replacement was let in December. This has nearly concluded, with the final remnants of the foundations to remove. The tricky business of removing a small amount of asbestos was carried out between Christmas and New Year by a professional subcontractor and no further action will be needed which is re-assuring.

The Armour Block replacement will occur in three stages over the next 2 1/2 years. We expect Stage 1 building to commence in May once the tender has been let and to take between 9 and 12 months. This will deliver new Science facilities.
