## Super 8 Badminton

The NBHS Super 8 Badminton team comprised of William Hollis (Captain), Paul Bauer, Karljeet Cappie, Charlie Geange, Ricky Losauro and Alex Niederer achieved a major milestone for the school by winning this year's Super 8 tournament. This is the first time in the tournaments 20-year history that a NBHS team has managed to win the top spot, it was fitting that this was achieved at an East coast venue. This ends Palmerston North Boys' High School's three year winning streak, which itself was preceded by Hamilton Boys' High School's tournament record of seven consecutive titles.

Heading into the tournament, we knew that 2019 was likely to be our best chance of winning the shield. At September's NZ Secondary School Championship, we drew with Hamilton BHS on matches narrowly losing on set

countback. The defending champions, PNBHS, were going to be the toughest challenge, however.

This year's draw put us up against Palmy Boys' in the opening round of the tournament. Our doubles pairing of Paul Bauer and Charlie Geange won their match in two sets whilst William Hollis and Karljeet Cappie played a close three setter (21-18, 19-21 19-21), ultimately losing to Palmy's Matthew Cao and Jason Lau. Despite determined efforts, Charlie Geange and Karljeet Cappie both lost their singles matches to stronger opponents. William Hollis outclassed Palmy's Matthew Cao winning in two sets (21-12, 21-15). Whilst Paul Bauer had an exceptional match against Palmy's top seed Jason Lau, winning 22-20 and 21-13. Overall, the tie was drawn 3-3 on matches with the winner determined by set countback.

Weta workshop was first on the agenda and the students were given a behind the scenes look into all the job opportunities that exist in our creative movie industry. This helps them link the skills they are learning in the classroom to future career pathways.

A brief trip to Te Papa was the next stop, the fantastic Sculptures created by Weta workshops are still on display as part of the Gallipoli Exhibition and are a must see.

Victoria University also gave our 60 accelerate Year 10s and 50 Senior Maori students a motivational presentation on university and what they believed to be the pivotal aspects that create student success.



The feedback from all our students to the lecture and workshop activities was overwhelmingly positive as they gained thoughtful insights into and engaged with what they can expect moving forward.

During the same week, we had a very entertaining concert provided to approximately 900 of our students by EXCEL School of Performance from Auckland that displayed outstanding student musical talent. Afterwards these students and tutors ran music workshops with our Year 12 and 13 Music students.

Our successful and very interesting Career- Art – Music trip to Wellington enabled our creative Year 12s and 13s to see the inspiring art facilities at Massey and especially the commercial music suites that illustrated the advanced equipment our students need in going into a degree course that allows them to upskill at such an excellent level. Visiting Yoobee's new facilities in Wellington also gave our students the challenge of seeing the high-level animation




and design works that they could potentially be involved in over the next two or three years with intentions of working at WETA.

It is my belief that if students get inside and outside classroom opportunities they will be inspired. Inspiration leads to successful careers.

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# NBHS Rugby Season Update

NBHS rugby teams make up approximately a quarter of all teams playing rugby in the Hawkes Bay Secondary Schools rugby competition. In 2019 NBHS have three F Grade teams, two E grade teams, two D grade teams, and an Under 14 squad (plays traditional inter – school fixtures and the Super 8 winter tournament). Our Under 15 team and three 3rd XV teams play against the other HB Secondary School 1st XV's while our 1st and 2nd XV teams play throughout the central and lower north islands in traditional, Tranzit and Super 8 competitions.

All competitions are under way.

**F Grade (Div 7):** The three F grade teams are all competitive units. Numbers are light in these grades with 14-18 players available for each team depending on injury status each week. There has been discussion with coaches and some parents around the light numbers. HBRU are adamant they want us to keep the three units playing for the good of the competition. The reality is that many schools this year are just managing to put out an F grade team with some schools only having 12, 13 or 14 players regularly. HBRU has introduced the guideline that less than 12 players is a default. If a team has 12, 13 or 14 players the opposition team must meet those numbers.

Combining three NBHS F Grade teams into two will mean that on many weeks, NBHS teams of 23-24 players will be up against opposition teams of 12,13 or 14. Sidelines aren't the best way to spend your Saturday morning as a passionate schoolboy rugby player.

**E Grade (Div 5):** Two very competitive E grade teams are underway. They played each other recently and it was a great battle with a single try separating the two teams.

**D Grade (Div 4):** Two D grade teams are underway. One team has got out of the blocks well result wise. The other team is building in confidence and performance every week. These teams train alongside each other

and are doing a lot more contested training together which is proving great for both teams.

**U15 Team (Div 2):** Once again the NBHS Under 15 team is a serious team and has already beaten Havelock North and Karamu 1st XV teams as they work hard toward their end of season National Tournament hosted here at NBHS. Working closely with the Under 15 coaches and management to ensure the best players (form, attitude and behaviour) have the opportunity to represent the NBHS U15 team.

**3rd XV's (Div 1):** The 3rd XV's have all played each other in some titanic interschool games already this season. The teams are all well coached and are looking to make their mark as the number one team. One team has ended up slightly younger with primarily year 11 (5th form) players. The vision was to have three very competitive units and with some additional support for the younger team I am confident this will be the case this season. More players at this age/stage, more even and competitive teams, outcomes that are well on track to be achieved at this level.

**2nd XV (Super 8):** Bevan Lynch and Hoki Ward are doing a great job with the 2nd XV. They are a happy crew that are fronting on the field at a new and improved level in 2019. Exciting times ahead for this team and great to be working closely with coaches and players for the good of both the 2nd and the 1st XV environments.

**1st XV (Super 8):** Dave Russell and I are working closely with the 2nd XV coaches to make sure the best performed players on and off the field have the privilege of representing the 1st and 2nd XV's. The 1st XV team is working hard to achieve consistent performance. Leaders are growing into their roles and all players are understanding more each week about the level of sacrifice, dedication and commitment to team that is required at this level.

Not the proudest day for the 1st XV last Wednesday against Scot's College but a lot of resilience and courage

shown to head up to Gisborne two days later and get the job done against GBHS on Saturday.

**U14 training squad.** A selection (approx 35) of the best U14 F and E grade players train each Tuesday with myself and Tyrone Robinson. Trainings are focussed on skill and game understanding. From this group the 22 players who represent NBHS Under 14 team at interschool and the end of season Super 8 tournament will be chosen. NBHS Under 14 beat Tauranga Boys High Under 14 recently and will face PNBHS, Feilding High School and Gisborne Boys High School (three times) in preparation for their end of season Super 8 tournament.

## NBHS rugby team selection process

We have a different philosophy here at NBHS to some of our other traditional rival schools around the country and some of the other H.B Schools. Many who do not have the playing resources and one which chooses to distribute talent differently especially at the

junior levels. I think it is important that as NBHS Rugby Club members you are aware of the teams that represent the school each week and a little but about how and why we select them this way. I'm happy to discuss at any time any queries and or debunk some of the myth's that can sometimes permeate our local community.

There are aspirational channels for our best young players through NBHS Under 14 and Under 15 teams who play in the U14 Super 8 tournament and the Under 15 National Tournament respectively. All junior teams (F, E and D) grade teams are selected to be as even and equal as possible. Players who have played representative Ross Shield or NBHS U14 in the previous year are

evenly spread amongst these teams. From there players are allocated based on positional spread for each team. It really is as fair and even as we can make it. We believe this is the best model for all, building the most resilient, competitive and successful U15 and senior teams of the future.

U15, 3rd, 2nd and 1st XV teams are selected through a pre-season trial process. This year we have run the most extensive trials for our 3rd XV teams to ensure that all our senior players get chance to be seen and that we roll out three even and competitive teams in this grade. Already there have been some great inter-school battles between these three NBHS 3rd XV teams this season.

## NBHS 1st XV Coaching Initiative

Pleased to report that the 1st XV coaching initiative is being well received and utilised by the junior teams.

The NBHS 1st XV supports all our junior rugby teams (F, E and D Grade) in 2019 by providing coaching support and junior player mentoring at Tuesday trainings. Their brief is to support our future NBHS senior and aspiring 1st XV players by sharing their technical and tactical knowledge and supporting the coaches.
