### The following resource is common-sense advice and worth using again:

#### 1. Eliminate distractions

Get rid of anything that distracts you and allows you to procrastinate from your work. While you are studying or writing, turn off your phone's ringtones and vibrations and put it in a drawer where you won't be tempted to answer calls and messages. Allow yourself to check your phone only once per hour. Get off Facebook, Messenger, YouTube and other distractions. Save them for when you are relaxing.

#### 2. Be focused at the task at hand

Have you ever been so focused and devoted to what you are doing that time seems to have flown by? This mental state is called 'flow' – when you are completely immersed and involved in an activity. Flow actually makes you feel energized and motivated and increases enjoyment of the activity (not to mention being super-productive). To achieve flow, find a challenge, develop your skills, eliminate distractions, set aside enough time, set clear goals and focus completely on the task at hand.

#### 3. Use a calendar

A calendar is a great way to plan your day. It'll be an easier way to schedule your appointments and remember your obligations. It can also help you to study in blocks and devote time to different subjects. Set up a calendar on your phone or computer and ensure you stick to it. Factor in extra time in case an activity takes longer than expected.

#### 4. Use a checklist

A checklist is a great way to ensure you stay on task, by listing your tasks and checking them off one by one once completed. It also gives you a sense of accomplishment to tick off tasks when completed.

#### 5. Get organised

Once you have your calendar and checklist set up, you should be well on your way to being better organised. Being organised will save you a lot of time and allow you to allocate and manage your time better. Set up simple systems, such as document filing.

#### 6. Schedule rewards

You need to treat yourself when you do the right thing. Take a few minutes out of every hour to take a break and do something you enjoy, like go for a walk or watch some TV. The break will also allow your brain to relax and be more productive when you return. However, whatever you do, make sure you don't overindulge until you have completed your tasks.

#### 7. Get a good night's sleep

A good night's sleep is essential to make sure your body and mind is rested and fresh for the next day. It can be hard to concentrate if you didn't get 7 to 8 hours of sleep in the night before. Pulling an all-nighter studying is less productive then consistent study. Manage your time better by including sleep in the schedule.



### Pounamu Workshop Day Carving and fashioning stories of love!

Recently, a small group of Māori Studies students spent a day in our school workshop with Matua Pōhatu, Matua Aaron, and his friend fashioning and learning how to carve pounamu. In addition, they have been studying the traditional story of pounamu in class since.

The story speaks of Poutini the taniwhā coming across a woman bathing in the northern seas of the Bay Of Plenty. Her name is Waitaiki. It is said that she enchanted the taniwhā, who ended up kidnapping her and fled south. Waitaiki's husband, the chief Tamaāhua, discovered she was missing, and aided by a tekateka he tracked them south. During Poutini's flight the taniwhā lit fires to keep Waitaiki warm. Amidst the charred remains of each fire, Tama-āhua found precious stone. The continued pursuit of his love was determined and unrelenting. Fearing the strength of his pursuer the taniwhā took sanctuary on the West Coast of the South Island, eventually stopping in Milford Sound. Realising that Tama-āhua would not rest until he reclaimed Waitaiki, Poutini decided the only way to keep her forever was to turn the woman into his essence. The taniwhā transformed Waitaiki into pounamu, laid her in down within the riverbeds of the Arahura River and slipped downstream past the waiting Tama-āhua.

### Napier Boys' High School Young Farmers win National Grand Final.

Matt Halford and Finn Beamish were named the Junior Young Farmer of the Year at the National Grand Final held in Hawke's Bay in July. It was the first time NBHS students have won the competition, but what was unprecedented was that Guy von Dadelszen and Macabe King were placed second, giving 1st and 2nd in the country to NBHS.

The competition was held over 2 days on the 4th and 5th July. Teams from all around the country converged on Napier to participate in a range of practical and technical challenges that included a speech, 1-hour exam, practical skills, irrigation set up as well as many other challenges throughout the day.

The weather was freezing, and all teams has to cope with southerly gales and horizontal rain showers throughout both days. It made for very challenging times, but the boys handled it extremely well.

The evening prizegiving also had the final round: the top 5 teams had to face off in a 4-round quiz in front of a crowd of over 500 people. Once all the points had been tallied, Matt and Finn were judged 1st, with Guy and Macabe a close 2nd.

As always, the boys couldn't compete without all the help and support from many people and businesses. They support our club and their members, and it is gratefully received.
