Evacuation plan

Following an Earthquake and Tsunami warning

If we were to have an earthquake that was so strong that you could not stay standing or longer than 1 minute in duration we would, when safe to, evacuate the school. The students would head along Georges Drive, turn right into Carlyle Street and then up Chaucer Road to the Botanical gardens. The students would be kept there until you came to get them.



On Tuesday 18 February 2020 the school will close at the earlier time of 12.15pm for a teacher union meeting. Buses will leave at 12.30pm. Feeder buses will operate at the normal time.



Property update

Armour Block replacement

Progress continues on the new Science and English buildings. This week saw the first steel beams go into place; we are not far off completion of the slab which should deliver the first four science laboratories and resource room by July this year. Demolition of the current old science labs) will occur in August allowing the start of Stage 2 – the first part of the new English classrooms.

Weathertightness repairs

Several buildings over the next three years will have re-roofing and/or re-cladding (with some internal repairs) to remediate weathertightness issues which have been identified. This will be managed to ensure we always have sufficient teaching and recreational space. The initial repairs focus on the stairwells and roof of the Administration building. This should start in April.

School Investment Package

This was the \$400K announcement from the government in late 2019. This investment is likely to focus on health and safety improvements to the library (heating, cooling, lighting and modernisation) as well as student shade around the campus.

Boiler room upgrade

This was completed late last year and is now in use – this is a fantastic conversion of a “dead” space. This room is now known as H3. The intention is that the exterior colour scheme will be rolled out through the school as weathertightness repairs are completed.

National Athletics

Wellington December 2019

The weather played a major role in these championships. There were gale force winds which saw the Pole Vault metal cover lifted off the ground and thrown over the fence as well as driving rain which saw the Road Race cancelled. This was a huge disappointment for the boys down to run the Road Race as we thought we had a good chance of placing in the senior 3 man team event. Reid Livingston also hoped to be right up there vying for a medal.

Meanwhile on the track our sprinters were winning heats and quarter finals. But then Ben Allan's hamstring tore. What should we do? Get him to try and compete or withdraw and focus him on the relay. Ben had run the fastest time in the 100m qualifying but we decided he was unlikely to be able to run the semis and finals of the 100 and 200 so withdrew him to focus on completing just one race the Senior Boys' relay final.

Josh Adegoke and Wesley Akeripa continued right through to the Senior Boys' 100m final. Josh, the only Year 11 running against the Year 12 and 13's missed the bronze medal by .01 of a second. He made amends in the 200-final grabbing the bronze medal, an amazing effort from a Year 11.

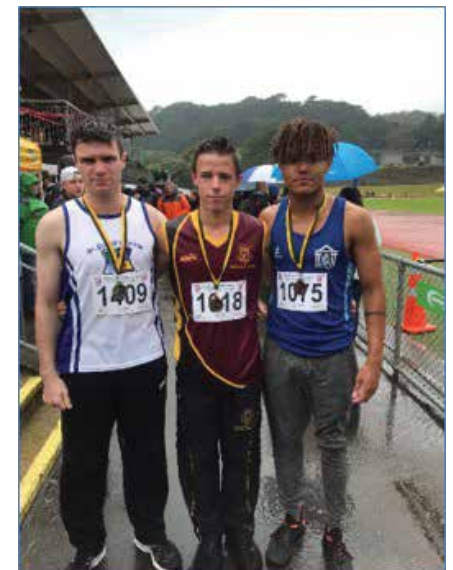
Ryan Jones competed in the Open Walk, but he was not able to take the gold like he did in 2018, this time he placed third for the bronze medal. Meanwhile Guy Harrison was competing in the Para events. He won the full range of medals – a bronze, silver and gold in the 200m, 400m and Discus. He too missed competing in his best event the Road Race.



Onto the relays. Our Junior Boys were all still only 13 or 14 years old and would be able to compete in this event again in 2020. They had trained hard and won their heat on Saturday night in dreadful conditions. In the final all three changes were close to perfect and they ran strongly to take the silver medals. The team was Calvin O'Rourke, Logan Woods, Lexx Musson-Body and Ryan Shotter.

Next up the Senior Boys 4 x100m. The commentators at the track and on SKY TV had talked us up because we had the most boys progressing through the 100 and 200m rounds. But we had Ben running leg 2 would his hamstring hold up or not. We needn't have worried. Wesley Akeripa ran the first leg and handed the baton to Ben. He accelerated the hamstring held and he passed the 4 teams outside us before he passed the baton to Toby Archer with a perfect late change at the far end of the box. Toby ran a great leg giving us a 20m lead by the time he passed the baton to Josh Adegoke. Josh extended the lead and we won by 30m. A Gold beating the likes of Auckland Grammar, Christchurch Boys etc. We missed the NZ record by .4 of a second a record we surely would have beaten in fine weather, but sport is full of what ifs.

It's that time of year when your students are heading back to school. Education is about more than school. The school part can have a big impact on success. You can help your child succeed at school. Start the day with a good breakfast. My Dad was right decades ago when he said kids need a good breakfast if they are going to learn. You don't need to go to the lengths that my Mum did – with porridge followed by cooked up leftovers - something wholesome like toast with eggs or peanut butter, or bacon and eggs will provide the protein the brain needs to function well. Your students need to have (non-sugary) drinks before school and at school. Hydration is vital. "Fred" came to me at lunchtime for extra tuition. He couldn't do a problem that he had been able to do in class that morning. "How much have you drunk today Fred?" I asked. "Not much" he replied. Ten minutes after he had had a drink of water, he could easily manage the problem. Children, and adults, need between eight and ten hours sleep a night. Without it you can't function as well. Thinking and managing emotions are the first to suffer. Managing emotions is more important to success than intelligence. In one class we collected data on how many hours students slept per night. Most students got between three and six hours sleep a night – needless to say this group of students struggled to succeed at school. Make sure they have all the books and specialist gear they need as soon as possible and that they get to school on time. Last but not least, listen and encourage. Sometimes school can be brilliant and sometimes it's hard going. Your students need to know you will listen in the highs and the lows.

Important notice from the Public Health Nurse.

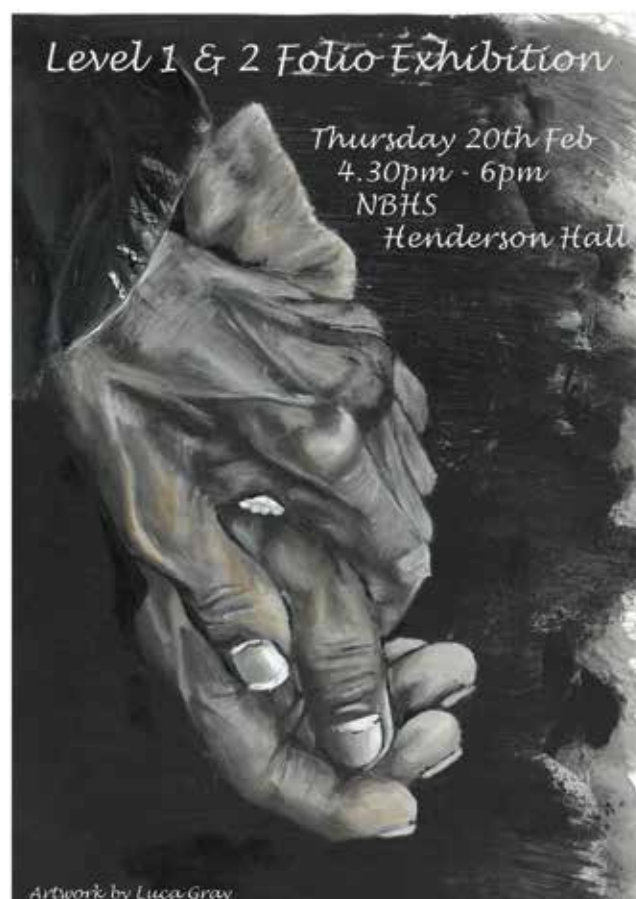

Uniforms

Thank you to parents who ensure our young men come to school everyday in correct school uniform. For yrs9 – 11 this is short sleeve polo top, shorts, socks and black leather shoes.

Year 12 & 13 students have a summer senior top (\$45) which can be purchased once old shirts are due to be replaced. Please be aware that in winter these shirts are not to be worn. Seniors may also wear grey trousers and white shirts with a school tie.

Summer shirts are worn during term 1 & term 4. Year 9 parents should be prepared that in March they will need to buy a winter top ready to wear on the first day of term 2. We will let you know when winter uniform is available to purchase from the shop. Only the newer style winter shirts are to be worn by junior students.

Please have your son purchase grey trousers and a white shirt if he is required to wear a No.1 uniform as part of a senior sports team or cultural group.

Uniform shops new and second hand are ONLY open:

TUESDAY 3 – 4.30pm (after school)

THURSDAY 1.10-2.10pm (during student lunch hour)

Please organise to purchase uniform during these hours. Parents do not need to be present at the shop –

money can be internet banked into school accounts or prepaid during office hours and students can be outfitted by staff. We are happy to exchange sizes so long as uniform has not been worn or named.

The uniform shop is a very busy place during term 1. Being organised in advance of changeover deadlines helps keep the queues down.

SECONDHAND UNIFORM

The second-hand shop is open at the same time as the new uniform shop. The school sells on behalf and has no control on what stock is available. It is the responsibility of those wishing to purchase second-hand items to come into the shop and buy - no refunds are given.

If you have school uniform you wish to sell in the shop, items can be left at the school office. Staff price the goods and at the end of each term Parents' League arrange for cheques of sold items to be posted out. We ask that second-hand uniform must be in a reasonable condition. Only items sold in the new shop are sold in the second-hand shop.

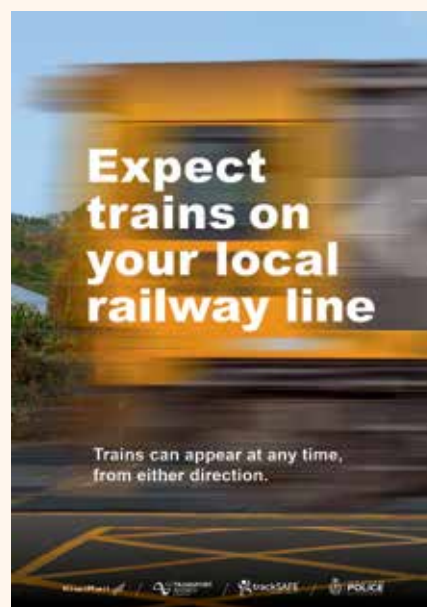
