From The Headmaster's Office

The future of ICT at Napier Boys' High School

The lockdown and sudden need to deliver a form of online learning has refocused our priorities on digital learning at the school. We have an ICT and e-learning strategic plan which is very much relevant but has been unaffordable in terms of the number of devices we as a school would need to provide as well as the investment in professional learning alongside competing priorities.

The boost in staff capacity and their desire to retain these skills plus some fresh thinking on how we can manage the hardware has made it feasible to look at a student BYOD plan alongside the integrated use of Microsoft Teams as an e-Learning platform. This also aligns with the full implementation of compulsory Digital Technology at year 9 and 10 from the start of 2021 plus

extra time provided for the new year 9 as part of their orientation next year on learning our essential IT skills.

We are very mindful that our focus has been on getting our young men's writing up to an acceptable standard once they come here. This remains and any introduction of compulsory devices will require a blended learning environment – using the device as a tool, particularly where the task undertaken is one which cannot be achieved without a computer. The other not negotiable is that there must be a reduction in the number of books the boys carry – the device should not be an add on, rather a substitution.

The health and safety issues of devices are not just confined to keeping young people safe online, it also relates to what they are expected to carry in an age where school locker bays are no longer provided. **Our intention is not**

to have boys on devices 25 hours per week.

The following article got my interest as both a parent of teenagers and educator. I have always been very conscious of how screen time can overtake people's lives (insert all ages here!). The research will keep coming but it appears that the reality is rather like diet, everything in moderation. Balance is the key.

TOO MUCH SCREEN TIME?

When schools were closed, most children's screen time went through the roof. That can be a blessing for parents cooped up with their children 24/7, but isn't this harming young people?

In the last few years we've been hearing that excessive screen time melts their brains, shrinks their attention spans and weakens their social skills.

Digital abstinence for young children was the strong message until quite recently.

Worries like these have a long history, with parents fretting about each new

wave of entertainment technology – radio, movies, TV.

Is viewing time all that damaging?

For starters, the evidence linking screens to harm is, in reality, paper thin. Recent studies have downplayed negative effects. In fact, they say, a couple of hours of screen-based leisure is associated with improved peer relationships and increased sociality.

Gaming meets our fundamental needs for exploration, competence and social connection. And games often improve rather than undermine our reasoning abilities.

As for concerns about children getting isolated, the Internet is the world's best tool for distanced socialising.

So parents and educators needn't fret too much during the coronavirus lockdown but they should monitor what children are watching and playing, sometimes playing and watching with them, and steer them toward brainy games, age-appropriate educational videos, documentaries available on streaming services, cooperative and team-oriented video games and timeless films that don't just entertain, or distract, but teach



ineffable lessons about life, love, and family.

Winter Uniform Terms 2 & 3

All students should now be in correct winter uniform – long sleeve tops for juniors and seniors.

Years 12 & 13 students may wear white shirt, tie and grey trousers or new style winter shirt with grey trousers. Winter shirt & shorts can be worn by seniors but not the short sleeve senior shirt which may only be worn in terms 1 & 4.

Please have your son purchase grey trousers & tie from school if he is required to wear a No.1 uniform as part of a senior sports team or cultural group. White shirts are only available in size XS and XL+ from school shop. These can be purchased from any shop in town.

Now that everyone has been back at school for several weeks following lockdown and uniform shops are open; uniform will only be sold during shop opening hours. The exception for this is when an emergency purchase is

needed e.g. split shorts. Uniform can be pre-paid into school accounts so that students can buy uniform without the need to give them cash to bring to school.

Staff will no longer be filling uniform orders sent via email.

Uniform shops new and second hand are open at the following times:

TUESDAY 3 – 4.30pm (after school)

THURSDAY 1.10-2.10pm (during student lunch hour)

PLEASE NAME ALL UNIFORM AND SPORTS GEAR – especially now sports games have started. If it is named it can be returned to owner if brought into the office.

SECOND HAND UNIFORM

The second hand shop is open at the

same time as the new uniform shop. The school sells on behalf and has no control on what stock is available. It is the responsibility of those wishing to purchase second hand items to come into the shop and buy - no refunds are given.

If you have school uniform you wish to sell in the shop, items can be left at the school office. Staff price the goods and at the end of each term Parents' League arrange for cheques of sold items to be posted out. We ask that second hand uniform be in a reasonable condition. Only items sold in the new shop are sold in the second hand shop.
