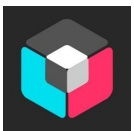

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Headmaster's Kōrero

Kia ora e te whānau,

At the start of this term I do not think I would have believed anyone if they had told me we would spend three weeks of the term in a Level 4 lockdown, and a large portion working through COVID restrictions. It certainly altered my induction and plans to meet more of the school community. More importantly it disrupted academic learning, sport activities and social events. Nonetheless, we all persevered and managed as a school to deliver effective online learning programmes that enabled students to continue to engage and prepare for assessments. And what an absolute pleasure it was to see, on our return to face-to-face learning, the direct focus of our boys as they reconnected with each other, with their kaiako, and with their learning and their work. As I walk around our kura daily I see young men 'head down, bum up', as my parents

used to say. The boys are an absolute credit to the work of our wonderful staff and to you, as supportive parents and caregivers.

One of the key messages as we returned to 'normality' is to maintain a sense of certainty despite the COVID challenges. Schools should be safe places. A place students can come to grow and develop without the distraction of wider global issues. In many ways these issues are beyond our control. Consequently, our focus needs to be on what we can control and working hard to achieve our goals. Building strong relationships, with a focus on manākitanga and strengthening connections will certainly go a long way in helping achieve positive outcomes.

Speaking of the importance of making meaningful connections. This week is Mental Health Awareness week. The

Mental Health Foundation have chosen Take time to Kōrero – Mā te Kōrero, Ka Ora. The idea is that the little, everyday conversations we have are surprisingly important and they make a big difference to our mental health. They suggest that you take notice of the kōrero that makes you feel good and do it more often. Over time, these small chats create meaningful connections, help us understand each other better and ensure we have people we can count on when times are tough. It can be checking in with a mate, having a kōrero over kai, or saying hi to a stranger. A little chat can go a long way.

The Board and Senior Leadership Team are working with the Education Review Office on their new review process. This involves one Evaluator, formerly called a Reviewer, working continuously with the school over an extended period. This will involve half-day meetings twice a term over the whole year. Their role is to support the school in reviewing and planning the implementation of priorities, as well as ensuring we meet compliance expectations.

As many of you may have read in the local media, Ishaan Prasaad continues

to make a miraculous recovery from his serious accident. Ishaan has a way to go before he overcomes his many physical injuries. But he has shown us all that it will only be a matter of time before he is ready to reengage and get back to a normal routine. We look forward to his eventual return.

Finally, I personally have really enjoyed my first term leading Napier Boys' High School. The community has been incredibly welcoming. The outlook for the school is not only positive, but also exciting. I am aware that there will be the odd 'bump in the road'; just like what we have now. However, we have a strong resilient staff that are keen to develop and see our school thrive, and learners that really want to be the best they can be. As we begin to think about the school holidays we can only hope that, as a country, we have done enough to get every student back to school at the start of next term.

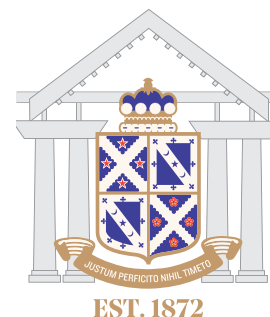

Mark Sweet Visit

On Friday 13 August, a Level 3 English class had the opportunity to listen and engage in discussion with local author, Mark Sweet. The students – who are studying his novel, *The History Speech*, for both internal and external assessments – had the opportunity to hear about the author, the stories that inspired the text, and his current project.

Having constructed several questions before the presentation, the students had the chance to delve into Sweet's mind and discover how fact and fiction were merged to create the narrative. Those who have read the text are well aware of the sensitive societal issues it addresses. The students were left slightly shocked by the events that had inspired the novel, but far more aware of the historical context in which Sweet develops his characters and ideas.

Sweet encouraged the students to challenge some of their own values and ideas, particularly around simple emotions like joy. This prompted a wider discussion as to how and when contentedness becomes both happy and joyful. He also alluded to wider readings that the class have been doing through their literary analysis of the novel and discussed how he saw it connect with various critical interpretations. Despite not wishing to be labelled as a Māori

writer, Sweet was interested in our suggestion that his writing showed a Post-Colonial consciousness in its style and content.

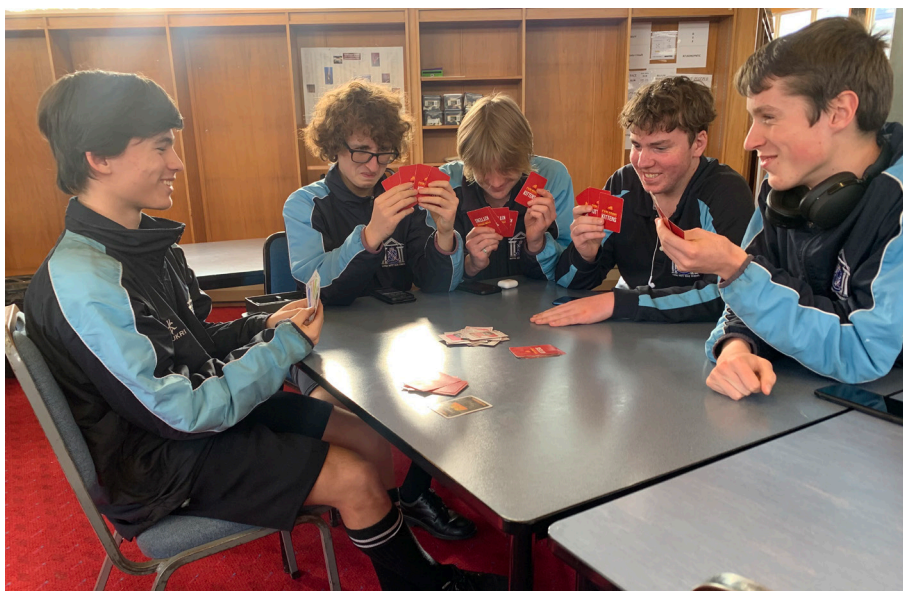

Term 4 Is Back Into Summer Shirts

Uniform Shop Is Relocating

The uniform shop is being relocated to the "P" block (closer to main Chambers Street entrance). For students who require new uniform before Term 4 begins, the uniform shop is open on **Friday 15 October**: 10am – 3.30pm (last Friday of the school holidays).

Hired No.1 Uniform

If your son has a blazer or grey trousers that belong to the school hire pool we ask that you please return them to school office. Only rugby season hire should now be with students and when all rugby events have finished, we expect these to be returned promptly.

We do ask that if your son is involved in a cultural or sporting activity that requires blazers to be worn, grey trousers are purchased. Please consider this for 2022.

Lost Property

Please name **all** uniform.

If items are handed in to the school office and they have a readable name, they are returned to the student.

Uniform shops new and second hand are open only at the following times:

Tuesday, 3 – 4.30pm

(after school)

Thursday, 1.10-2.10pm

(during student lunch hour)

Please purchase uniform during these hours. Caregivers do not need to be present at the shop – money can be paid online into school accounts or prepaid during office hours and students can be outfitted by staff.

We are happy to exchange sizes so long as uniform has not been worn or named.

Second Hand Uniform

The second hand shop is open at the same time as the new uniform shop. The school sells on behalf and has no control on what stock is available. We are unable to refund on items purchased from our second hand shop.

If you have school uniform you wish to on-sell, items can be left at the school office. Staff will price items. As cheques are no longer accepted by banks you will need to supply a bank account for proceeds of sale.

Second hand items must be in a reasonable condition and be our current uniform to be sold.

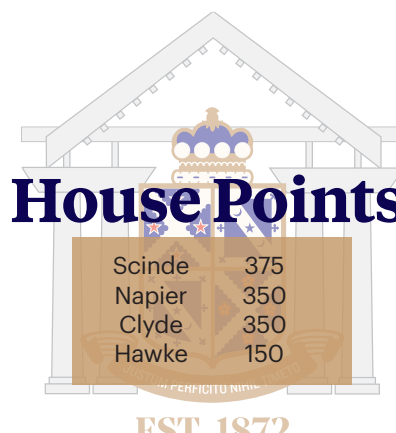
